Bike Maintenance Group December Report

Over the last month we have distributed 31 bikes and brought in \$940.00 (so far!) On 4 December Sam McGowan, from Village Church at Kelvin Grove, came and picked up 10 bikes for distribution to international students he deals with. This is the second lot of bikes Sam has from us. The first lot was 9 bikes back at the end of June. Sam tells us the bikes are eagerly 'snapped up'.

Next, we sold two bikes, which brought in \$430.00. After a break, on Friday of last week I took a load of scrap metal (bike frames, wheels, and other various bits and pieces), and by segregating the metals, was paid a healthy \$109.00. This past Monday we sold a further 2 bikes for a total of \$400.00. On Tuesday children's bikes were picked up for Mission Australia who will distribute them to the Watson Road State School.

The bike group has officially finished for the year. However activity is continuing. We picked up some bikes from a person in Chapel Hill last week, but left a number of old bikes behind. I said I would come back for them to take them for scrap. I was then offered some white goods as well! On Wednesday three of us picked up the scrap. As I write this I am in the midst of separating the aluminium etc from the steel, with the aim to deliver it all before Christmas, thus earning some more moolah.
