SPEAKER: Captain Wel Gamble


TITLE: A Life Well Lived as a Guardian of the Reef.

ABSTRACT: I will be presenting a broad overview of the role of a Reef Pilot from a very personal perspective. It will include the treasures and tribulations of my 32 years on the Reef and the experiences I have had in the time.

BIO: Captain Wel. Gamble spent 52 years as a seafarer attaining the rank of Master before becoming a Great Barrier Reef pilot for 32 of those years. He piloted 1373 ships in the Great Barrier Reef and PNG waters exclusively doing cruise ships for his last five years as a pilot.

After working as General Manager of Auriga Pilots, which is the operating company now managing Pilots working in the reef, he retired in July 2023 but still provides occasional consultancy services to the industry.

He developed a lecture program for the cruise ships which always included a very personalised view of his vocation as a Great Barrier Reef pilot or "Guardian of the Reef" as their company motto states. He maintains a close association with the environmental managers on the reef remaining up to date on this issue. He is also a close associate of the unique indigenous Torres Strait people, a number of whom are close friends.



3D Printer arrives at the Shed

The Shed has purchased a very capable 3D printer that now resides in the Cox Computer Room. The printer has been fired up and 2 test prints made; a small scraper for cleaning schmutz off the build plate and a small bud vase.

The scraper took 10 minutes to print and consumed \$0.25 in PLA Filament. The Vase took 9 hours to print and consumed <\$5.00 in filament. These were printed using a fine 0.4mm diameter nozzle that gives an excellent finish together with great resolution but takes a long time to print. Switching to a larger nozzle (0.8 mm) will result in a coarser finish and a much shorter print time.





The Bambu Labs X-1 Printer can print objects using a variety of plastic filaments with varying properties, finish and colours. The printer has a useful AMS feeder that allows for up to 4 different filaments to be loaded and printed. The printer has a glass enclosure and an extraction fan with an activated filter to capture any fumes.

We will be offering lessons on how to create a 3D computer model and then print it out. As with any production tool there is learning and training involved with operating it effectively.




